CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

Chairperson Miller called the meeting to order at 10:02 a.m. Executive Director Halsey called the roll. Members Adams, Lee, Miller, Nash, Olsen, Silva, and Walker all indicated that they were present.

Chairperson Miller announced the passing of former Commission Member Maria Carmen Ramirez, who served the Commission for eight years, from 2012 to 2020, as a local agency member from the Oxnard City Council. Chairperson Miller extended her condolences to Ms. Ramirez's family and invited additional words from Members, staff, and the public to honor her memory and her service.

Member Adams stated that Carmen's passing was an unbelievable loss to the people of California and Member Olsen noted her understanding of the mission of the Commission, and that she understood deeply the impact that Commission decisions had on people. Executive Director Halsey stated that she was a great mentor, a leader, a great supporter of staff, and that she set an example of how to be an effective advocate while also being kind, which is a special skill.

This testing was filed by the County of Los Angeles on Elections Code Section 14201 as added in 1994 and amended in 2017, and a Secretary of State memorandum that notified counties that their election -- county elections officials, for certain precincts, would need to provide language assistance and additional languages for elections conducted between May 2020 and December 2021.

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Staff finds that the test claim was not timely thought with respect to 14201, as added and amended in 1994 and 2017, because the test claim was filed more than a year after the effective date of the statutes and more than a year after first incurring cost; however, the test claim was timely filed with respect to the memorandum.

Staff finds that the memorandum does not mandate a new program or higher level of service on county elections officials; and, thus does not impose a reimbursable state mandated program.

Prior to the memorandum, state law already required the county elections official to provide translated facility copies of ballots, and other forms of language assistance, whenever the Secretary of State determines that low English deficiency voters of a single language minority met a 3 percent threshold in a precinct.

- 1 The memo implemented preexisting law by identifying languages that met that 3 percent threshold. It did not 2 3 require county elections officials to perform any activities that were not already required, and the 4 5 parties agree with staff recommendations to deny this 6 test claim. 7 So accordingly, staff recommends that the Commission adopt the proposed decision to deny this test 8 9 claim and authorize staff to make any technical

At this time we invite the parties and witnesses for Item 4 to please turn on their video 8 9 and unmute they microphones. 10 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Good morning, Mr. Feller, 11 thanks for being here. 12 MR. FELLER: Good morning. So this incorrect reduction claim challenges the controller's reduction of 13 14 cost claim by the City of Hawaiian Gardens for fiscal years 2003 to 2011. Controller reduced the number of 15 16 allowable collections from twice weekly to once weekly 17 and did not provide contemporaneous source documentation. 18 (Reporter clarification.) 19 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you very much. Let's try 20 that again, Mr. Feller. If you don't mind starting from 21 the beginning. 22 MR. FELLER: Of course. 23 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you. 2.4 Ms. McKenny, let us know if you can hear this time.

THE REPORTER: Thank you.

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MR. FELLER: All right. This incorrect reduction claim challenges the controller's reduction of cost claimed by the City of Hawaiian Gardens for fiscal years 2002-03, to 2011-12. The controller reduced the number of allowable collections claimed from twice weekly to once weekly because the claimant did not provide contemporaneous source documentation to support its claim under the reasonable reimbursement methodology, or RRM, for the twice per week trash collection's claim for the item period. Staff finds that the controller's reduction is incorrect as a matter of law because the RRM does not require contemporaneous source documentation.

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Additionally, the claimant provided additional documentation with the IRC that the controller may not have reviewed, so the proposed decision remands the reimbursement claims back to the controller to further review and verify the costs claimed under the RRM based on the number of weekly trash collections during the audit period and reinstate the costs that are eligible for reimbursement in accordance with the proposed decision. The controller and claimant both concur with the proposed decision.

Accordingly, staff recommends the Commission approve this IRC and remand the reimbursement claims back to the Commission in accordance with the proposed

1 decision. With this recommendation there are a couple 2 of minor corrections to the proposed decision. 3 First, page 30, in the conclusion should say, "the IRC is approved," rather than, "partially approved." And on 4 5 page 11, in the last paragraph of the summary of 6 findings, we recommend adding "approves this IRC and," 7 just those four words, before the word "remands" to make the summary consistent with the conclusion. 8 9 And as always, staff recommends the Commission authorize staff to make any technical non-substantive 10 11 changes to the proposed decision following the hearing. 12 CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Thank you very much. Any 13 questions -- oh, first, may parties and witnesses please 14 state your name for the record. Ms. Kurokawa.

Mr. Khanimani joined us on August 22nd and has hit the ground running, and we are delighted to have him on board. He's doing a great job.

MR. KHANIMANI: Thanks for having me.

CHAIRPERSON MILLER: Great. Welcome, Mr. Khanimani. We are grateful you're here and hope you enjoy your time with a remarkable group of people.

MR. KHANIMANI: Thank you.

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MS. HALSEY: Thank you. And then I have workload update. After this hearing, there are 38 pending test claims, 37 of which are regarding stormwater NPDES permits. There is also one amendment to permit and guideline, one statewide cost estimate, and one IRC active and pending, we're almost finished with those IRCs.

Finally, there is one additional permit and guidelines regarding stormwater NPDES permit that is on an active status pending the outcome of litigation regarding the test claim decision underlying that matter.

And staff currently expects to complete all currently pending test claims and IRCs by approximately the September 2025 Commission meeting, depending on standing and other workload.

Also, some of the test claims may be heard and

decided earlier than currently indicated so consolidated for hearing. And that is all I have.
