EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Office, Budget, Workload Update, and Tentative Agenda Items for the October 2026, December 2026, and February 2027 Meetings (info)

I. Office

A. Access to the Office

In the early hours of April 8, a burst pipe in the building where the Commission's office is located flooded electrical rooms on several floors which resulted in a small fire and an extended closure of the building. The building reopened and the Commission staff returned to the office on June 22, 2026. The building will have a temporary electrical shut down for additional repairs which will necessitate the closure of the Commission's office from Friday, August 14 through Tuesday, August 18.

B. Retirement

After 13 years of service to the Commission as Senior Legal Analyst, Carla Shelton will be retiring at the end of August. In addition to being the law librarian and her paralegal work, Carla has been the driving force behind the reorganization of the Commission's records. She has spent the last year setting the staff up for success in the future. While the staff wishes her all the best in her retirement, her leadership and dedication will be missed.

II. The Budget Act of 2026

A. The Commission's 2026-2027 Budget

The Governor signed the Budget Act of 2026 on June 29, 2026 (Statutes of 2026, chapter 19; AB 109, Gabriel).¹ The Commission's 2026-2027 operating budget is \$3,259,000 and is broken down as: \$2,823,000 for Personal Services and \$436,000 for Operating Expenses and Equipment which includes \$20,000 for a one-time increase in rent for fiscal year 2026-2027 only. This is an increase of \$48,000 from the total appropriation of \$3,211,000 for 2025-2026 after adjustments for salaries and benefits of \$43,000.

The Budget Act also includes \$90,607,000² for Local Assistance or local agency mandated programs—a decrease of \$3,496,000 from the 2025-2026 budget of \$94,103,000.

2. 5180-151-0001 – For Local Assistance, Department of Social Services

Although local agency mandates are generally now funded through the Commission's budget, recent budgets (including for 2026-2027) make up to \$4 million dollars available in county-optional block grant funding through the Department of Social Services' budget, for allocation to local agencies to fund activities that are reimbursable under *Interagency Child Abuse and Neglect Investigation Reports*, 00-TC-22. Local governments that receive the block grant funding are not eligible to claim costs under section 17560 of the Government Code for any costs associated with the program. The State Department of Social Services, in consultation with the California State Association of Counties, shall develop the allocation methodology for distributing the funds to the participating counties. Block grant funding apportioned according to this item is subject to annual financial and compliance audits.

C. K-14 Mandate Funding and Suspension

Unlike local agency mandate funding, K-14 mandate funding takes place outside of the Commission's budget. Among other things, the Budget Act does the following with regard to mandate funding:

6100-295-0001 appropriates \$51,000 "for local assistance, State Department of Education (Proposition 98), for reimbursement, in accordance with the provisions of Section 6 of Article XIII B of the California Constitution or Section 17561 of the Government Code, of the cost of any new program or increased level of service of an existing program mandated by statute or executive order, for disbursement by the Controller for claims for costs incurred during the 2024–25 fiscal year." 2. 6100-296-0001 – For Local Assistance, State Department of Education (Proposition 98) Program 98-K-12 Mandated Programs Block Grant

The Budget Act appropriates \$279.069 million for the Program 98-K-12 Mandated Programs Block Grant. It further provides:

1. The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall apportion the funds appropriated in this item to all school districts, county offices of education, and charter schools that request funding during the 2026–27 fiscal year pursuant to Section 17581.6 of the Government Code using the following rates:
 - (a) A school district shall receive \$40.41 per unit of average daily attendance of pupils in kindergarten to grade 8, inclusive, and \$79.27 per unit of average daily attendance of pupils in grades 9 to 12, inclusive.
 - (b) A county office of education shall receive:
 - (1) \$40.41 per unit of average daily attendance of pupils in kindergarten to grade 8, inclusive, and \$79.27 per unit of average daily attendance of pupils in grades 9 to 12, inclusive.
 - (2) \$1.35 per unit of countywide average daily attendance. For purposes of this item, “countywide average daily attendance” means the aggregate number of units of

average daily attendance within the county attributable to all school districts for which the county superintendent of schools has jurisdiction pursuant to Section 1253 of the Education Code, charter schools within the county, and the schools operated by the county superintendent of schools.

- (c) A charter school shall receive \$21.31 per unit of average daily attendance of pupils in kindergarten to grade 8, inclusive, and \$60.48 per unit of average daily attendance of pupils in grades 9 to 12, inclusive.

mandate claims collected as prescribed by Sections 17560 and 17568 of the Government Code for disbursement by the Controller.” Under this line item, Schedule (1) 5685010-Mandates provides “for payment of the following annual mandate claims collected as prescribed by Sections 17560 and 17568 of the Government Code for disbursement by the Controller,” \$1000 for each of the following mandated programs:

This line item appropriates \$40.899 million for transfer to Section B of the State School Fund, Program 98-Community College Mandated Programs Block Grant. It further provides:

1. The funds appropriated in this item are for transfer by the Controller to Section B of the State School Fund. Pursuant to Section 17581.7 of the Government Code, the funds appropriated in this item shall be distributed to community college districts that elect to participate in the block grant on the basis of funded full-time equivalent students (FTES) calculated as of the second principal apportionment for the 2025–26 fiscal year multiplied by \$37.51 per FTES.

2. If total funding provided in this item is insufficient to fully fund the rate specified in Provision 1, the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges shall proportionately reduce the rate to conform to available funding.
